Our **Seqwater Source Water Protection Program** is entering its fourth year, with it's focus this financial year on creating landholder-driven, community-wide projects within the Ewen Maddock Catchment to clean up our creeklines.

This project is a great way to:

- foster community relationships,
- provide a sense of stewardship over our environment  $\boldsymbol{\epsilon}$
- create meaningful change for you and your neighbours.

Projects range from weed control, revegetation works and erosion and sediment control.

## Biocontrol

Our Biocontrol facility produced 38,800 bioagent beetles this Summer! The beetles have been released at various locations around, Brisbane, Pine Rivers, Mary Valley and the Sunshine Coast to help fight Madeira and Cats Claw Creeper infestations.

Our monthly community macroinvertebrate monitoring days (Bug Club style explorations) were enhanced by 6 months of funding from Unitywater. Featuring nature journaling with special guest, Dion Dior, these days were held at various local riparian locations, with the finale focusing on saltwater invertebrates. A wonderful study, and many thanks to our sponsor.

## Nursery

We've launched our Trees4Resilience program - climate action by planting trees. This 3 year program is supported by a federal community sustainability action grant supporting community climate action projects.

#### Program aims:

- to promote climate awareness and meaningful climate action in the community
- to get 30,000 trees in the ground throughout our community (10,000 trees per year)
- host empowering workshops and activities for our community

# WEED ALERT Broad-leaved Pepper Tree Schimus terebinthifolius



Description: Originating from Brazil, this tree has become known as a very successful garden escapee, and is now listed as a Category 3 restrictive invasive plant under the Biosecurity Act 2014. It can cause skin reactions due to toxic resins, and hosts diseases known to affect citrus.

It spreads through seed dispersal via birds and from sucker growth.


ID: Grows up to 10m tall, small whiteish flowers followed by bright red fruits 6mm across. It's main flowering is autumn/winter.

Removal: hand pull or chip out young plants; dig out trees in winter; or you can apply herbicide to basal bark, cut stump or as a foliar spray

# Little Kurrajong



#### Brachychíton bíðwíllií

An ornamental small tree with stunning pink flowers in the springtime. Responds well to pruning to maximise flowering. It is likely to drop its leaves prior to flowering. Can be slow growing.

Its native habitat is dry rainforest, this tree is drought tolerant.

Family: Malvaceae

Aspect: Full sun - part shade

**Soil type**: Prefers moist well drained soils

Size: Up to 3m

**Habitat:** Rainforest





## Pink Evodia

Melicope elleryana

A fast growing tree with dense pink pompom flowers in spring to summer. Prefers seasonal water-logging soils. Great as a street tree. Attractive tree in the garden with a light spreading canopy, so other species can happily grow underneath.

Butterfly host plant to Ulyssess Swallowtail (Papilio ulysses).

Family: Rutaceae

**Aspect**: Full sun to part shade **Soil type**: Prefers moist soil

**Size**: 10 - 20 m

Form: Tree

**Habitat**: Wet sclerophyll forest
